


1001 fontaines - Child Protection Policy

As an international non-governmental organisation (NGO) carrying out activities specifically orientated towards children, 1001 fontaines is committed to protecting the security, privacy and dignity of these children when taking part in its programmes.

The 1001 fontaines Child Protection policy presents guidelines for protecting these children and ensuring their welfare in the context of the Water in School programme.

- **Children have the right to survive, grow and develop.**
Access to safe water is vital to ensure that children benefit from optimal conditions to grow and develop. 1001 fontaines, through the Water in School programme, contributes to helping these children to access safe drinking water free of charge when they are at school, contributing to their healthy development.
- **Children have the right to be treated with care and concern.**
1001 fontaines is committed to ensuring that children taking part in the Water in School programme are treated with care. All decisions related to the programme are made based on the best interests of the children and all staff working on the programme are responsible for guaranteeing that children are treated with dignity and concern at all times.
- **Children have the right to be secure from the fear or reality of abuse (physical or emotional).**
1001 fontaines recognises its duty of care towards the children when they take part in activities related to the Water in School programme. This includes all workshops organised at school, including those to raise awareness on the importance of drinking safe water. When representatives of 1001 fontaines are present at school, they are responsible for ensuring that the children are protected from any possible sexual, physical, psychological and emotional abuse or neglect.
- **Children have the right to be protected from any inappropriate use of their image.**
Images, especially of children can be used abusively. 1001 fontaines takes the issue very seriously. All images presenting children on the organisation's website are strictly the property of 1001 fontaines. Downloading, copying or replicating photos or other information without 1001 fontaines' permission is strictly forbidden.
- **Children have the right to be portrayed with dignity.**
The use of images of children in communication and fundraising efforts can pose ethical challenges. 1001 fontaines believes that children have the right to be depicted with dignity and commits to never using images of children suffering to promote the Water in School programme or any other programmes in the field.
